Proposed

AP* aims to coordinate and liaise across the Asia Pacific (APAC) Internet organizations in coordinating and achieving our common and respective goals on technical operations, as well as global Internet issues as it relates to the technical functioning of the Internet in the APAC region.

AP* Objectives

Existing

- **AP* secretariat** would
 - a) Act as **International Liaison** with other AP* organisations
 - b) Will **provide a framework** for the AP* organisations
 - c) Would provide an environment such that it is a **spawning group for new AP* organisations**
 - d) Will **foster creation of International bodies** such as MINC
 - e) Will **host international secretariats** such as DNSO Secretariat , ccTLD constituency secretariat (more)

Proposed

- To coordinate across the community of APAC Internet organizations on identifying shared priorities towards strengthening the technical operations of the Internet.
- To foster meaningful dialogue and exchange information on key initiatives and updates across the APAC Internet organizations.
- To provide a platform for discussions on a common position or understanding on ongoing global Internet topics, such as governance and research/education, and its potential impacts to the APAC region.
- To facilitate resource coordination across APAC Internet organizations towards effectively achieving common goals.

- Where applicable, the community convenes intersessionally to provide relevant updates and/or form a common understanding/rough consensus on selected issues that may impact the technical functioning of the Internet in the APAC region.

AP* Retreat / Meeting Format

Existing

- Largely dependent on the co-chairs
- Regular updates/presentations
- Proposed session from the community

Proposed

- Name changed to “AP* Meeting” to reflect the actual format (not a Retreat)
- Trial and Error:
 - Mix of breakout/interactive discussions and updates/presentations
 - Updates/presentation segment to focus on technical coordination aspects
 - Where needed:
 - Intersessions to provide updates or prepare for upcoming AP* meeting
 - Liaise with other technical community for dial in/remote hub or other forms of collaboration

AP* Meeting Format (other ideas raised)

- On-site meeting– currently default twice a year
 - First meeting tagged to APRICOT
 - Second meeting tagged to APNIC
 - Potential third meeting to tag to other meetings in the region depending on objective and funding availability
- Networking session– depending on the meeting and funding availability, could be lunch, dinner, drinks
 - At the APRICOT meeting, typically overlaps with DotAsia hosted dinner, and AP* meeting attendees are invited to join
 - At the APNIC meeting, will tag on invites from APNIC/local host e.g. APNIC60 dinner at Hoi An
 - This will remain fluid for each meeting, until if we secure funding for this to be a staple part of the program

Role and Terms of AP* Co-Chairs

Existing

- Changed each meeting
- No explicit criteria
- Terms = Appointed for the upcoming meeting
- Role = organize the meeting program

Proposed

- Term = 2 years
- Chairs to change in staggering format to ensure continuation
- Criteria: No formal criteria, but should at least have attended 2 AP* meeting and appointed by the community
- Role:
 - Key driver for AP* meeting program
 - Drive intersessional work if required
 - Chair the STF meetings
- Chair will not be elected until next meeting at APRICOT

AP* Funding

Existing

- Support from meeting hosts (APNOG, APNIC, DotAsia) for main logistic costs
- ISOC/ICANN/APNIC provides sponsorship for Secretariat on-site support

Proposed

- Same as before but
- Attendance fee to (i) manage attendance number; and (ii) as back-up funds for incidental fees (e.g. venue cancellation fees)
 - Registration/attendance fee (only on-site attendees): 25 USD
 - [Reserve funds to not go beyond ~1,000 USD. Allocation of funds to e.g. coffee break, dinner if there are excess– to be handled meeting by meeting]
 - [Fees will be charged starting APRICOT2026; website to include information on fees charged and purpose]

Information and communications technologies for development

Summary

- WSIS+20 Zero Draft



- **Deeply concerned** - digital divides and inequalities between and within countries, regions and communities
 - 1/3 still no access to Internet + limited local content + limited digital skills
- **Recognise** - United Nations Group on the Information Society (UNGIS) created a **matrix** aligning the outcomes of WSIS, SDG and GDC
- **Acknowledge** - the importance of and the need to increase investment of:
 - Digital public goods – open-source software, data, AI model, standards, and content
 - Content: adhere to privacy and other applicable international laws, standards and best practices and do no harm
 - **Digital public infrastructure - Resilient, safe, inclusive and interoperable**
 - Multiple models – and each society will develop, and use share digital systems according to its priorities and needs

Bridging digital divides - WSIS+20 Zero Draft Summary



- **Concerned** – high-income countries using internet is 3.5 times of low-income; rural area only 50% population have access to Internet
- **Particularly concerned** – gender digital divides
- **Call for concerted action** - promote accessibility and equal access by persons with disabilities as a priority.
- **Further concerned** - elderly, ethnic and linguistic minorities, Indigenous Peoples, refugees and migrants are underrepresented online
- **Particular concerned** - digital divides between and within regions and countries, and within societies, and the rapid pace of development of digital technologies, may exacerbate economic and social inequalities

Bridging digital divides - WSIS+20 Zero Draft Summary

- **Determined** – achievement of universal meaningful and affordable access to the Internet and digital services
 - **Networks of high capabilities**; Affordability of access, data and devices; Availability of content (multilingual); Capability to make effective use of it
- **Committed** - achieving **entry-level broadband subscription costs** that are accessible to the widest section of the population
- **Reiterate** – the need for multilingual local content and services
- **Reiterate** – the need for capacity building to use the technology
- **Call on** - governments, multilateral development banks, relevant international organisations and the private sector – to **develop financing mechanism and incentives to connect the unconnected**

Sample discussion questions:

20 Min

Group 1

- What are the key difficulties in digital public infra development?
- Is “acknowledge” the importance of digital infra dev enough?
- What kind of inter-govt coop is required to build more networks of high capabilities?
- What needs to happen to ensure entry-level broadband subscription costs is affordable to everyone?

Group 2:

- Does the WSIS text addressed all the social concerns in APAC?
- Are the concerns practical?
- How can we measure these?
- How would you like MSM involved in the process? Should MSM involvement be explicitly mentioned in the text?

Capacity development - WSIS+20 Zero Draft Summary

- **Note** – lack of capacity is a major barrier to close digital divides; empower local experts and local communities
- **Reaffirm** – commitment to international cooperation
- **Recognize** – importance of cap bld, taking into account the specific social, cultural and linguistic needs of each society
- **Recognize** – the need to build digital literacy to counter mis/disinformation and abuse
- **Recognize** - need to scale up international cooperation and financing for digital capacity development in developing countries and to support the development of local content and content relevant to local realities online. The role of Regional Commissions and other regional bodies will be particularly important in this context.

Sample discussion questions:

10 Min

- Does the WSIS text provide enough support to achieve our goal/conclusion in the previous session?
- Does the WSIS text highlight our concerns in capacity building?
- Is it too geared towards digital literacy?
- How can AP* facilitate such “international cooperation and financing for digital capacity development”?

Financial Mechanism - WSIS+20 Zero Draft Summary

- **Recognise** – Scope and scale of ICT investment grown enormously, but require further sustained investment in infrastructure and services, capacity-building, R&D and transfer of tech, with public and private funds
- **Call on** – all **stakeholders** to promote an enabling policy environment for investment, and foster public-private investment
- **Note and reaffirm** – Sevilla Commitment – to close infrastructure gap
- **Recognise** – critical importance of private sector investment; encourage govt to create legal and regulatory framework conducive to increase investment
- **Recognise** – development banks and public funding played an important role

- **Reaffirm** - the working definition of Internet Governance in Tunis Agenda and Geneva Declaration of Principles that the management of the Internet encompasses **both technical and public policy issues**
- **Recognise** – the need to promote greater participation and engagement in Internet governance discussions by all MSM
- **Reaffirm** - that IG should follow the principles setup in Geneva and Tunis agenda, but also highlight “**enhanced cooperation**” is part of it
 - WGEG (Working Group on Enhanced Cooperation) to develop recommendation on how to implement “**enhanced cooperation**”
- **Call on** – member states and MSM to continue cooperation

Internet Governance - WSIS+20 Zero Draft Summary



- **Welcome** – the evolution of IGF from annual meeting to an ecosystem
- **Request** – Annual report on its progress to Commission on Science and Technology for Development
- **Decide** – IGF shall be made permanent forum of UN
- **Call upon** – IGF to report on outcomes (meeting and intersessional) to relevant UN agencies to duly take IGF outcomes into account
- **Call upon** – IGF to enhance its working modalities; enforcing its intersessional work and supporting national/regional initiatives (NRIs)
- **Call for** – Strengthening of the Secretariat of IGF and
- **Invite** - Secretary-General to make proposals concerning future funding
